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

DeAntwann "DJ" Johnson is a husband, father, author, mentor, coach, counselor, and sports statistician. He grew up in the Indiana foster care system and yet despite that, has gone on to lead a successful, and fulfilling life. Before spending nine years in the foster care system, DJ suffered child abuse, domestic abuse, and emotional trauma. At one point, he wanted to end his life, but he realized that he was on this earth for a purpose.

It wasn't an easy road, but DJ was fortunate

enough to have several people throughout his life who inspired him to do great things, despite everything he had been through.

He worked hard to overcome a life full of hardships, humiliation, aggression, and self-esteem issues, allowing him to be an active advocate for youth. DJ is a compassionate man with a special place in his heart for uplifting and inspiring students to be the best they can be.



#### HUNGERHEROES

A MOVEMENT TO END HUNGER IN BARSTOW

How One Doctor's Vision And a Truckload of Generosity Are Feeding Hope in a City Facing Food Scarcity.

"What's wrong, you seem angry today?"

"I broke three of my teeth trying to open a can of beans.."

"Why didn't you use a can opener?"

"I don't have one.
I'm homeless, and I was hungry!"

his conversation recently happened between Samera
Kabir, Director of Special Programs at Barstow
Community College, and a homeless student. And while this may seem like an extreme example of hunger, Samera and others on the front-line would say things like this happen way too often here in Barstow.

Stories like these reveal the daily challenges here in Barstow, where nearly 30% of residents live below the poverty line—making hunger an intergenerational issue that impacts our children, our parents, our grandparents, and maybe even you.

The scars of hunger and the trauma of poverty have weighed heavy on the area for decades. But thankfully, Barstow is witnessing a changing tide—a movement driven by a powerful sense of community spirit and resilience. It's homegrown, locally based, and hell-bent

on not just fighting hunger — **BUT ENDING HUNGER FOR GOOD IN BARSTOW.** 

#### Champions For A Better Barstow

At the heart of Barstow's fight against hunger stands Dr. Usha Gautam, a beacon of compassion and commitment. Her leadership has ignited a wave of community collaboration, notably with the BCC Food Pantry.

This partnership was born out of a near-death experience: a diabetic student collapsed at the BCC food pantry. This student, who later became a patient of Dr. Gautam, told her that she got much of her food from the food pantry. However, as a person with diabetes, many of the options were not suitable. In response, Dr. Gautam's clinic began supplying the pantry with nutritious alternatives and offering education on

lifestyle and portion control for those with diabetes.

When asked about the effectiveness of these interventions. Dr. Gautam affirmed their impact. "Yes, they are effective. The student who collapsed in the pantry had a dangerously high A1C level, which was life-threatening. But with access to better food choices here at the pantry and our education on what and when to eat, she now has her A1C under control. Getting her blood sugar under control was no small victory. The food pantry, coupled with food education, can be life-saving."

Almost 40 million in the US have diabetes. Here in San Bernardino County, nearly 12% are living with diabetes. It's a major problem that traditional healthcare and pharmaceutical treatments have yet to solve.

So we asked Dr. Gautam what motivates her to go the extra mile and extend



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support beyond her clinic's walls. Dr. Gautam says, "Charity begins at home." Her response reflects her deep commitment to the community and emphasizes the importance of locally based impact. This philosophy drives her and her clinic to seize every opportunity to make a meaningful difference in people's lives.

Dr. Gautam's Medical & Wellness Center has thus become a key player in the local fight against hunger.

Her approach is holistic— It's not just about providing food but also about fostering a community where no one, young or old, faces hunger and everyone has access to healthy nutrition.

In short, Dr. Gautam wants to end hunger in Barstow as we know it. Not just to make it better but to completely eradicate hunger.

# Is It Possible To End Hunger In Barstow?

Some skeptics argue that ending hunger in Barstow is an unattainable dream. They point to the enormity of the problem and the perceived lack of resources. However, Dr. Gautam remains undeterred in her optimism. She says, "No good intent goes unheard."

If no good intent goes unheard, then it's no wonder Dr. Gautam wasn't surprised when the Miracle Food Truck arrived in Barstow a few weeks ago. It was yet another validation of her





conviction that remarkable things can happen when a community unites in goodwill.

A few weeks back, Dr.
Gautam received a call out
of the blue. On the other
end was a man speaking
Spanish. Dr. Gautam, unable
to speak Spanish, passed
the phone to a staff member.
"He says I have a truck full of
food to give away."

Dr. Gautam counts the blessings but is expecting

something modest. But what arrived wasn't a pickup truck as expected. It was an 18-wheeler semi-truck filled to the brim with food.

Dr. Gautam began to cry as the doors opened, revealing the food. She knew how many people's lives would be impacted this holiday season by this generous donation.

As she wiped away her tears, she knew there was no time to dwell on emotions. The clock was ticking.

They had to distribute the food before it spoiled. Like a bat signal in the sky, Dr. Gautam rallied community partners, including Barstow Community College, New Hope Church, and Heritage IPA, to help distribute the food.

This generous donation and strong community collaboration led to hundreds of hungry people in Barstow receiving much-needed food during the holidays. In the weeks since, Fernando Rodriguez, the mysterious donor, Dr. Gautam, and the community distributed three more semi-truckloads of food.

Reflecting on the impact of these events, Dr. Gautam said, "This is just an example of what we have right here in Barstow. If we come together and collaborate, we have more than enough to end hunger. No one should go to sleep hungry when we have enough food to feed everyone. We just have to believe in our capacity to help others."

#### We All Can Help Our Community

Samera Kabir, Director of Special Programs and Services at BCC, echoed Dr. Gautam's sentiment. "When I reflected on the student chipping his tooth opening cans, I realized that a 99¢ can opener can mean so much to another person. The things we take for granted can change a life. So I try to remember that small contributions matter."

Acting on this idea and the motto 'BCC cares,' Samera and her team helped the homeless student. They started by sourcing poptop canned goods, thinking others might face similar issues. Next, they connected the student to the Wellness Center, so he had a place to shower. They also helped the student take advantage of other student support services.

In the end, his mood improved significantly.

The student was no longer angry. He was getting better on all fronts. Samera says, "It's early on, but he's moving in the right direction, in part from our small contributions."

## The Fight To End Hunger In Barstow

The future of Barstow's fight against hunger looks increasingly hopeful, largely thanks to the growing community collaboration. Dr. Usha Gautam's vision of a hunger-free Barstow is gaining momentum as more partners join the cause. This expanding network of support, ranging from local businesses to individual volunteers, is a testament

to the power of collective action.

Samera Kabir of BCC
Food Pantry shares this
optimism. "Last fall, we
served thousands of meals
through the pantry," she
says. "Our goal now is to
expand further, reaching
more people in need." Our
expansion plans depend on
government programs, largescale donations, like the
miraculous semi-truck full of
food, and smaller, individual
contributions that collectively
make a significant impact.

The spirit of collaboration and the belief in the power of every contribution, big or small, are driving forces behind this initiative.

"Every bit helps, whether it's a major donation or the everyday small contributions," Samera adds.

This movement isn't just about providing immediate relief. It's about building a sustainable support system for those facing food insecurity. And as important, it's a movement driven by local Barstonians who dare to believe in a better Barstow for all.

The best part is, as much

as we look at Dr. Gautam or mysterious mega-donors like Fernando Rodriguez as heroes, they might say something different. Like all of us, they are making whatever small contribution they can.

Which means we are all being called to action for our community. Whether you can offer a 'miracle' like a semitruck of food or something as simple as a can opener, your small contribution matters.




